(empirical data) or at least a comparative perspective between Europe and other countries. Please make your PhD students aware of this possibility.



European Sociology meets in Andalusia to analyse the situation of sport in the wake of the epidemiological crisis

Between 7 and 10 September, the 17th Congress of the European Association for Sociology of Sport (EASS) was held in Andalusia, entitled "Sports in the face of the global health crisis of COVID-19. Great social challenges".

The current critical situation of sport requires an in-depth analysis to address the various difficulties it is facing as a result of this epidemiological crisis.

172 sociologists and sports scientists from 70 universities and scientific research centres from Japan, China, Brazil, Argentina, New Zealand, as well as a large part of the countries of the European Union, with 28 nationalities represented, took part in the congress.

Coinciding with the hosting of the European Year of Sport in Andalusia, the autonomous community hosted the 17th EASS Congress "Sports in the face of the global health crisis of COVID-19. Great social challenges", the official congress of the European Association for Sociology of Sport (EASS). An event that has finally been organised telematically, due to the epidemiological crisis. This is the first time in the history of this European association that its official annual congress has been held for the second time in the same country, with Andalusia as the congress venue on both occasions.

Different universities have participated in the organisation of the Congress, with the University of Cordoba and the University of Seville as the central management bodies, and it had the support and collaboration of the Regional Ministry of Education and Sport, the Andalusian Institute of Sport, the Andalusian Studies Centre Public Foundation of the Andalusian Regional Government, and the Sociology of Sport Research Committee of the Spanish Federation of Sociology.

The congress was attended by 172 sociologists and PhDs in sport sciences from around 30 European, Asian and South American countries, belonging to 70 universities and scientific research centres. During the event, 17 conference panels and 112 framework papers on sport policies, management, media, youth, health and well-being, discrimination and violence, gender and sexuality, among many other topics, were held. In addition, presentations were given. There was also a workshop for young researchers on how to submit research project proposals within the framework of the European Commission.

The invited speakers, were Mark Doidge (University of Brighton, United Kingdom), Kari Fasting (Norwegian School of Sport Sciences, Norway), Ramón Spaaij (University of Amsterdam, Netherlands), Belinda Weaton (University of Waikato, New Zealand) and Raúl Sánchez (Universidad Politécnica de Madrid, Spain), who gave lectures on solutions to sport management in the context of the epidemiological crisis, the democratisation of sport from a gender perspective, a critical view of the main conflicts in football in the European context and the emergence of new outdoor sports such as hiking and mountain biking.

The winning paper may be considered for publication in the European Journal for Sport and Society.

The programme educates responsible sport managers and professionals for future's private, public and non-profit sectors. The total extent of the programme is 120 ECTS.


